In the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Year (2022) an Indian Chestnut Tree was planted near a still pond in Howick Hall Gardens by MU Diocesan President Margy Tasker-Brown, on behalf of Newcastle Diocesan Mothers Union. The tree is a symbol of Mothers' Union intent to help safeguard the natural environment for future generations: the fifth Mark of Mission of the Anglican Communion. In the life-time of our grandchildren and their grandchildren this sapling will probably grow to be 10M high and 12M wide and will outlive them all.



Gardens like Howick have offered rest and renewal for countless visitors in times of need. A garden is a microcosm of God's creation — where plants and animals co-exist, offering the shade and shelter, the peace and hope that God unwrapped in Eden.
