INETY is a fair age to reach - especially if you're in good health and reasonably sound mind! Derek (my husband) celebrated his 90th birthday on 14th October: the anniversary of the Battle of Hastings in 1066 when William conquered Britain and changed the course of history. This year, 957 years later, we lifted a glass to Derek, to history in its unfolding, and the birth of a great grandchild.

There are times and circumstances when birthdays and other celebrations may be eclipsed in the raw battle for survival. The Battle of Hastings was not the first war in history – nor the last. October saw horrific events unfold in what we

call the 'Holy Land'. Jews, Christians and Muslims, the three religions of 'The Book', all hold this land 'sacred' for different and valid reasons in their faith history. Sadly, our deeply entrenched beliefs have led to conflict throughout history, not least in the 'Holy Land'. It has always been so! Perhaps now is a time to ask 'Must it always be so?'

Advent is a time for waiting: to wait for the coming of God's promised Word – the promise of peace and justice in the world. 

Prisoner 'Fresh Start' backpacks: RUCKSACKS FOR PRISONERS ON THEIR DAY OF RELEASE

Prisoner rucksacks are given through a prison charity for which some MU members volunteer, to prisoners who have no family to go to on the day of their release. After they have made the long journey by bus from Acklington in Northumberland to Tyneside, they need a change of clothes the following day to be presentable to sign on and to look for accommodation, and work.

This gift could make the difference between a prisoner sinking or swimming on their release. Often a Branch will put together one or more rucksacks full of gifts.

Contents:

Toiletries: soap, disposable razors, toothpaste, toothbrush, comb, deodorant, nail clippers Small towel, flannel

Underwear (boxers), socks T shirt

Jogging bottoms

(**not grey**, as that is the colour of prison wear)

Fleece or jacket

gloves and woollen hat

Mothers' Union Annual Gathering 2023

N a beautiful Autumn morning we made our way to the Barbican in York to attend the Annual Gathering together with over 700 members and guests all eager to meet in Christian Fellowship.

On gaining entry using our barcode tickets (tech works!), we were handed our program and a little packet of sweets. We took our seats in this wonderful building and received a warm Yorkshire welcome from Hilary Castle, Diocesan President of York, who was then joined by Bev Jullien CEO.

Bishop John Packer, York Provincial Chaplain began with a prayer, "Lord God, who makes all things new, we gather together in your name" – reminding us what this important day was all about.

June Houghton, York Provincial President, and Hilary brought laughter and fun into the day when they put on leather motorcycle jackets with Cross motif on the back. They then introduced members of the Harley Davidson Owners Group onto the stage. Along with their other MU initiatives held over last year the bikers have raised and donated monies to AFIA. Hilary and June commented "little things make a difference and never judge a book by its cover".

Our Worldwide President Sheran Harper reminded us to "step boldly forward and the Lord will guide you always". She introduced to us her teddy bear, "Alex the Pilgrim", her symbol to stand against domestic abuse. This highlighted our new campaign entitled "Rise up against Domestic Abuse". She received a standing ovation following her many words of hope and love to give us inspiration. She referred to us as "Her beloved friends".

Mary Sumner House and the Reimagining Steering Group gave updates on the financial situation at present and the challenges which lie ahead. They thanked everyone for their generosity and fundraising. The emerging mantra came out as "Grow membership, Grow funds to move into the future – Mothers' Union to infinity and beyond".

Bishop Emma Ineson of Kensington, MU Central Chaplain, highlighted the need to develop stronger links between the Clergy and MU, "Building bridges wherever we go will help us on our way". York Diocesan Chaplain Revd John Ford supported this further, reminding us that the Clergy need our support and prayers at this moment in time. There was an open discussion with the audience putting forward examples of how this could be moved forward.

As the day came to a close we were "Called to Action" by both Sheran and Bev who reminded us "With God nothing is impossible – we are starting on a new adventure together". Sheran blessed us all and asked if we would journey with her from "Transformation Now" to "Transformation in Action".

Bishop John Thomson of Selby brought this amazing event to a close with prayer. We made our way from the Barbican in a torrential downpour to arrive rather soggy but elated to York Minster for Evensong.

The heavens opened – MU in York Minster

N true biblical fashion it rained in York – just for an hour – as we walked from the conference centre to the Minster. We arrived as drowned rats to be reassured by the Canon in Residence that, in York, the rain always falls on the righteous!

There were over 1000 people in the Minster: 700 MU members and lots of others keen to know what was going on (and sheltering from the rain!) The choir was inspiring. The refurbished organ lifted us to a new stratospheric level of praise.



The NT reading was from Revelation 21.1-4 and was read by our WW President, Sheran Harper. *…and I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband....'*

At the end of all the evening prayers, the Most Revd Stephen Cottrell, Lord Archbishop of York, addressed the congregation.

'The heavens opened' he said, referring not only to the rain in York but to the reading from Revelation. 'When I read this passage about the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, dressed as a bride adorned for her husband, I can't help imagining a sea of Mothers' Union members dressed in blue and white!' The image triggered the first of many responses of laughter during his address.

He spoke out of deep personal conviction and experience of the life-transforming work of Mothers' Union across the world: work reflecting the love of God in all the darkest places.

Did we realise that all the most important things happen in the dark? he asked – that Light comes out of the darkness? The world was created out of darkness. Jesus was born in the night. Jesus died under the darkest of skies. The resurrection occurred in the dark of night. Mary Sumner's vision came out of the dark experience of motherhood in difficult times.

Then he reminded us of another Mary... 'Mary Magdalene came to the tomb at the break of day.' he reminded us. 'She was the first to attend the tomb to care for the body – she was the first to go looking for Jesus – the first to recognise the Lord – the first to share the news with others.' He suggested that Mary Magdalene should be made an honorary member of Mothers Union!

'Mary Magdalene saw the Lord but thought he was the gardener.' ('Though in truth He IS the Gardener!') 'Jesus does not greet her with jubilant triumphalism. Instead,



he says quietly – **'Why are you** weeping? Who are you looking for?' The response to those questions was transformative – for Mary and for the disciples and subsequently for the whole world.'


He suggested that these two questions of Jesus are the very questions that Mothers' Union asks in the darker corners of life: 'Why are you weeping? Who are you looking for?' Two questions, which unlock the inside stories of those facing challenging circumstances and which lead to conversations and transformative actions. As members of Mothers' Union, he said, we simply need to be there in our communities – asking those two questions: **'Why are you weeping? Who are you looking for?'**

Faith in Action and Inside Stories – from the Chaplain

FEW of us stayed in the Bar Convent in York. It has an inside story – hidden from the outside world during times in history when Catholicism was banned, with a chapel which is still hidden from the outside. It has faithfully championed education and hospitality for centuries and still does. Did you know?



We heard Sheran Harper tell the inside stories of some of the people she has met on her travels round the world. Many of them associated with domestic violence – often horrifying and very disturbing. There are many inside stories carried by people we know, people in our congregations and communities: stories of abuse hidden from public sight out of fear. 'Stand with me!' Sheran begged, 'in working to get rid of domestic violence and abuse.' The new RISE up campaign is part of that MU commitment. Do you know about it?

Please heed Sheran's request, 'Stand with me to help combat domestic abuse.'

Bishop Emma Ineson (our MU national Chaplain) asked 'Why is MU the 'best kept secret' of the church in Britain and Ireland? Despite branches in thousands of churches, our 'Faith in Action' remains hidden from view, masked by a notion that we are about tea, cake and visiting speakers. Is our Faith in Action an 'Inside Story'?

Bishop Emma reminded us that MU is called to stand in the gaps – the liminal, edgy or transitional places where no-one likes to remain for long. To **stand in the gaps...**



- between the Church and the World – locally and globally – bringing the needs of the world to the church and bringing the hands of love from the church to the world;
- between our Clergy and Communities – building mission and ministry together.
- between the 'Now and the Not yet' – turning despair into hope and helplessness into action.

She prayed us three gifts to equip and enable us:

- Listening attentively to one another and to God – to understand.
- **Peace-making** through disagreements.
- **Faith** nothing is impossible with God.

As your chaplain I also ask you to **stand by me** in our efforts in Newcastle Diocese to build fruitful relationships with our clergy – praying for their ministry, asking for their prayers for MU projects, building mission and ministry opportunities together in our local communities, and heeding the inside stories. It's the little things that count – and God can make much of them. Did you know? Of course, you did!

St David of Wales counselled: **Be joyful. Keep the faith. Do the little things.**

S we walked from the Barbican to York Minster, many of us joined the Mothers' Union march through the streets, carrying 'RISE UP' banners to highlight the evils of Domestic Abuse.

Diocesan Council on 13th October 2023

A warm welcome with refreshments greeted members as we arrived on a pleasant afternoon at St John the Evangelist Church, Kingston Park, for our Mothers' Union Council meeting in October. Margy opened the meeting by welcoming all. Worship was led by Chaplain Anne Marr and Diana McNaughton and began with the words **'Lord God, who makes all things new, we gather in your name.**' Prayers followed a theme of Faith in Action with all joining together to sing 'Living Lord.'

Business followed, as previous minutes were agreed, Margy summarised MU work in the diocese over the past six months, giving thanks, and trustees gave news from their units.

Margy welcomed our speaker Melanie Hinson, Director of Primary Education at Northumberland Church of England Academy Trust, to talk about the Story Sacks given to children in our diocese in a previous MU project. Melanie had taught in city schools before moving to become Head Teacher of Whalton Village School where she had worked for 10 years with Margy. She then moved to the Trust which oversaw a number of schools throughout the county educating children from two to eighteen. The Trust's values were Love, Inclusivity, Goodness, Hope and Truth. Her priority throughout her teaching career had been to put the child first, and to broaden their experience. Firmly believing that reading was essential, she aimed

to ensure that no child left school illiterate. This was challenging for many rural families where there were low expectations and poor transport links. Many families were in crisis. In many homes there was not a single book. so she had been very grateful for our help when we gave Story Sacks to her Early Years Unit to encourage reading and language, especially during COVID. Her talk was informative about the needs of children but was merged with many funny anecdotes of her time working with Margy.

We should have concluded with a video from The Gathering in York but the video was not available on the day. The meeting ended with us all saying the Grace.

SHADES OF GREEN – ASPECTS OF GODLY GARDENING MU Retreat 19-20 June 2023 at Shepherd's Dene

N a green blouse and a leaf patterned skirt, Revd Anne Marr introduced us to the first of many Gardens, the 'Garden of Intention'. Imagining a garden where we've been happy, our "Garden of Eden" if you like, the colours, the scents, the sounds, we remembered all was not well in the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve had to leave. But God never meant us to be banished for ever, Jesus comes to restore us to our 'Garden of Life'.

It was fitting to celebrate a Eucharist in God's Garden of Intention, with great hymns – "All creatures of our God and King", "Lord of all hopefulness" and "Immortal, invisible God only wise" – we all sang lustily. The final prayer of the session concluded "Help us to restore the beauty and the balance of your gift to us."


Anne invited us to think where we might be in our 'Garden of Life' and suggested that after lunch (baked potatoes and a choice of fillings) we might create a mosaic or a collage of a tree, or a garden, reflecting our thoughts and prayers for the people in God's Family Tree. Cutting tiles out of masses of green paint colour cards from a DIY store (unbelievable names!) some got creative, some went for a wander, and some just enjoyed the beautiful sunshine, chatting with friends old and new.

After tea (and cake) we reassembled in the 'Garden of Wilderness'. "Wilderness places" come in many forms, barren bomb sites or disorientating overgrowth, and sometimes we cannot see the bigger picture. Yet there is worth-ness there. Anne had created a lovely quiet corner for reflection in the Chapel with a glorious arrangement of wild flowers and leaves, things you'd attack if you found in your garden (see page 16). And the poem we read during the session talked about "cheerful unrepentant weeds: ... These weeds - as down to earth as you or me - are parables of the wisdom and work of God". So we moved from the 'Garden of Wilderness' to the 'Garden of Hope'. We may wonder what purpose we have in life, but we know we can play our part with God's help.



Jackie and her fellow members from St Francis led us in Compline after supper, following the Franciscan model which Barbara Bailes led for us last year. It was good to think of Barbara who wasn't able to be with us this time. Anne gave us amazing facts about trees to read in case we couldn't sleep! There are 422 times more trees than people in the world.

Most of the 14 residents shared Morning Prayer before breakfast, taken from Celtic Daily Prayer using Monday's suggestions about Creation. Day visitors joined us in the 'Garden of Renewal', to remember our Indian Chestnut Tree planted in Howick Hall gardens. It should outlive our grandchildren. Our relationship with God needs to "stretch its branches towards the sun". After a lot of hot dry days we now had soft persistent rain, splashing in the gutters and





streaming down the windows; I felt all the bushes in the gardens thanked God for it.

Tuesday's Eucharist began in the 'Garden of Tears' but the second of two Gospels took us into the 'Garden of New Life'. Jesus calls us to be gardeners of the Word, to scatter seed, bringing it to new life. We sang "Morning has broken", "Now the green blade rises" and "How great thou art!" with Bernadette Farrell's "Unless a grain of wheat" during Communion.

Afternoon activities included planting seeds, but most of us just chatted in the dining room until it was time to enter the 'Garden of Joy' where our mosaic pictures lay on the floor for us to admire. Jackie presented Anne with a plant as a token of our gratitude. The lovely photograph in the handout of the source of the Jordan was so unlike





what I imagined, it made me rethink my mental picture of "the river of the water of life" we'd read about in the Book of Revelation. The poems and prayers in the handouts were mostly taken (with permission) from "There was a Garden" by Eddie Askew. The final prayer began "Lord, whatever our story, wherever we find ourselves today, help us remember your story ..." and ended "Eden restored, the earth redeemed, and we are truly at home with you." It was a fitting conclusion. *Lesley Wright*
