Attention all Stitchers, HELP!


Our previous Worldwide President Lynne Tembey whose daughter is a member of the First Internet Branch, has been a huge supporter of our branch from its outset.

We get grants for AFIA and some of our refuge work but to top these up, and for anything else, we need money in our Diocesan Fund. This fund pays for our Journals, travel, postage, information technology, emergency kits, hire of halls and all other running costs without which we cannot continue and develop our mission.

During COVID our income truly

stagnated, whilst our membership

continues to decline. This is now causing concern. We do not want to raise our subscriptions further

We need to think prayerfully and thoughtfully what we can afford, it is our responsibility.

Monies can be given in memory of past members – remember to give Julian the details. I know we are




all passionate about our amazing family charity, let's do this together.

Our Prayer Diary



RAYER is at the heart of Mothers' Union life.

Mid-day prayers are said daily around the world by members and supporters in a united chain of faith, hope and love.

All members receive a copy of The Prayer Diary. The Prayer Diary is now divided into months, with a monthly prayer, theme, reflection and creative prayer. Each month has a linked weekly theme and a daily prayer. The daily prayers are written by members. The prayers for one week in every month are written by overseas members and the remaining weeks written by members in the UK. Newcastle Diocese have a small team of members who contribute towards three weeks of prayers in one of the months. In the 2023 Prayer Diary, we wrote prayers for September, with the theme of Peace and Reconciliation. Anne Marr, our Chaplain, also wrote the monthly prayer, reflection and creative prayer. If anyone wishes to join the group who write the prayers, please contact me.

The Wave of Prayer is included in The Prayer Diary. The members and work of every diocese worldwide are prayed for at some time during the year. Newcastle Diocese is prayed for at the beginning of December. This is the point in the year when we provide the Wave of Prayer service sheet and our branches can join together to pray for our own members and work as well as the work in our link diocese.

Included in the Prayer Diary are a few Faith in Action articles, highlighting an aspect of work being undertaken by Mothers' Union in the world, including a prayer for that work. It is always inspirational to read these stories and know it is part of our worldwide organisation.

The Prayer Diary is given to every member for individual daily prayers but it is also an excellent resource for use at branch and diocesan services.

Julian Brown took us through a look at our finances stressing the need to increase our membership and our funds.

Anne Marr has developed some new booklets, which she hopes will encourage new and existing vicars and others in our diocese to learn more about the work of Mothers' Union. This will stress all the good things which MU does in our area and beyond (see page 7). A letter of encouragement and support from our incoming bishop will be included in this booklet.

In response to the need to increase fund raising members were asked to come up with ideas. These ranged from a raffle, a 100 club, concerts,



and a simpler more effective way of collecting gift aid. Margy hoped that someone would take on the role of "Fund raising lead "to help this.

Members were reminded of the retreat. They were asked to write accounts of some of the successful projects undertaken in the branches and send them to the Journal, the website and Facebook. To help with projects, Mary Sumner house staff have agreed to send out information about important events and projects in good time so that the information can be disseminated to the branches.

At the end of the meeting there was time to chat to members from other branches face to face instead of on Zoom, before travelling home in almost daylight.

WELCOME TO BISHOP HELEN-ANN!

HAT a delight to have a new Bishop, also a new Diocesan Patron! Bishop Helen-Ann Hartley is the 13th Bishop of Newcastle and the youngest diocesan bishop in the Church of England. Her appointment was approved by Her Late Majesty The Queen. On 6 March she paid homage to His Majesty King Charles at Buckingham Palace, and was installed in Newcastle Cathedral on 22nd April 2023.

The Inauguration Service in the Cathedral was inspiring, creative and inclusive. Following the traditional 'knocking at the door of the Cathedral', the new bishop was admitted. She was led down the aisle by a group of children from a local school, Helen-Ann walking hand in hand with two of them.

We sang a hymn from New Zealand, where Helen-Ann once served. We sang for God's caring in this land and 'for ahora to let each other's mana stand'. ('Ahora is Māori meaning 'allembracing love' and 'mana' is Māori for 'dignity')

Bishop Mark and Bishop Midttomme from Norway anointed Helen-Ann for her service as bishop whilst Dara, a volunteer from the West End foodbank, asked God's blessing on her. Bishop Metlha from Botswana blessed the new bishop as she

was installed in her 'Cathedra'. Our President, Margy, led the intercessions with a prayer for family life and for children whose homes offer neither security nor love.

The Cathedral choir and organist excelled. We were sent out to a resounding fanfare and each with a gift from Bishop Helen-Ann of a bar of 'slave-free' chocolate made near Ripon (where Helen-Ann was bishop) in a specially designed wrapper to feature Coldingham (where she lived her earliest years) and Newcastle

(where she now serves.)

Born in Edinburgh, her early years in the Scottish Borders, then schooled in Sunderland. where her father was a minister. Helen-Ann savs. "There's a really deep sense of coming home in lots of ways." "This is a region that shaped and formed me as a child growing up, and also shaped and nurtured my faith." "I am inspired by the example of the Northern Saints, whose engagement in God's mission lies deep in the fabric and contours of the land."

Helen-Ann was ordained in 2005 in the Diocese of Oxford and taught Biblical Studies at Ripon College, Cuddesdon, where she met her husband Myles, a musician from Cumbria. In 2010, they moved to New Zealand where Helen-Ann served as a Dean in Aukland, then as Bishop of Waikato in the country's North Island. In 2018 she returned to be Bishop of Ripon. Helen-Ann is active in the world of media and is a keen runner.

The Archbishop of York said: "Helen-Ann brings rich experience and a tremendous passion for communicating the gospel, as well as a deep commitment to championing those often under-represented in our society."

Bishop Helen-Ann brings back from New Zealand some old Māori wisdom about care in society: an ancient Māori proverb translates 'With your basket of food and my basket of food the people will thrive.'

She is an enthusiastic supporter of Mothers' Union and is looking forward to engaging with us on our local projects. She writes the following endorsement...

"Newcastle has a unique connection to MU: the first Bishop, Ernest Wilberforce, encouraged Mary Sumner to launch what was to become a global organisation. As I sit and write these words at his desk, which is in my office, I am honoured to endorse and support the work that MU does. Prayer and action are at the heart of the Gospel and I hope they will frame all our work together in God's name."

Let us continue to pray for her ministry amongst us and for her husband Myles.

Working with our Cathedral

E were asked to make baptismal shawls for people of all ages being baptised.
I have had a great response to this and do not need any more at present.

We were also asked if we could make **kneelers** for one of the chapels in the cathedral. We plan six small kneelers in dusky blue fabric. In the centre we will use the Celtic symbol for the family. The stitching will be in dark blue, yellow and white. The Mothers' Union name will be written on the top of the kneeler, and the name of the stitcher will be sewn onto the base. You may wish to pay for a kneeler and dedicate it to someone: in that case their name can be added on the base of the kneeler.

Midday prayers are said on first Thursday of each month in St George's Chapel and our Chaplain Anne leads the 12.30 Eucharist a few times a year. Members meet together in the cathedral cafe in the morning and some join together after for lunch. **All are welcome.**

On 3rd August the Eucharist will focus on Mothers' Union and Mary Sumner, and our choir will take part.



Our Worldwide Links

One of the most engaging aspects of Mothers' Union is that we are a worldwide organisation, and that we are linked in prayer and care with members all over the world, through the Wave of Prayer (see Prayer Diary article on page 3), with each group of Dioceses having a few special days. Our partner Dioceses and our days of prayer are listed on the Wave of Prayer card shown which comes from Mpumalanga Diocese. It is good to see that they have many of the same concerns as we do, that they embrace women's ministry, and try to combat gender-based violence – and that they also pray for us.

Members of the First Internet Group seek to keep in touch with our links, each writing to one country with which they have a personal connection, while I write to Zonkwa and to Central Buganda, since I have visited nearby Mothers' Unions in both Nigeria and Uganda. We have had little success so far in getting responses from our links, but we do find out about them through Facebook and other social media, so we are able to pray for them and imagine their lives and concerns. I have a Powerpoint presentation about all our links, which I constantly update, which I am happy to share with any Branch.

Several of the projects described on pages 8 & 9 have been carried out by just one or two branches, in their locality, and some more are mentioned below:

- Christmas foodbags and gifts for each family at two refuges and two hostels
- Welcome packs are regularly delivered to one refuge for families fleeing with nothing
- 'Bags of hope' for parents of children starting school
- Reading bags for a First school

Support for local foodbanks with groceries and cash donations

This is in addition to the projects we all support, often in conjunction with another charity:

- Holidays for 136 adults and 196 children in 2022
- 107 gift bags for the People's Kitchen, as well as jogging bottoms and trainers
- Christmas hampers for asylum seekers, and gifts for the children
- 20 'Fresh start' backpacks filled with essentials for released prisoners
- £200 donation to a medical centre for baby boxes for refugees
- Emergency toiletry bags for all major hospitals in our area
